In 1922, two years before New Port Richey received its official charter, the first Chasco Fiesta was born of the imagination of one of the city's early champions, Gerben DeVries. He found a scroll, he claimed, within a clay cylinder along the Pithlachascotee River's banks. On that scroll was a tale recounting the experiences of a Spanish girl and boy, captured and raised by a Calusa tribe in the late 1800s. The pair was accepted into the tribe and later were named "King Pithla" and "Queen Chasco." Many initially accepted the legend as fact; however, DeVries ultimately disclosed that he had fabricated the tale himself.

"He looked at what Tampa had done with the story of José Gaspar and the already-successful Gasparilla Pirate Festival, which had started about 18 years earlier," says Cami Austin, Chasco Fiesta Chairperson who has been associated with the

festival for over three decades. "In this new city, with very little history of its own, he realized that he could make up his own story to attract visitors to New Port Richey, which was crucial back in its earliest days."

The festival's initial purpose was as humble as it was ambitious to raise funds for a new and permanent library. Now, 103 years later, Chasco Fiesta remains a pillar of the community. And while it has evolved in many ways, it preserves certain elements that honor its legacy.

"As New Port Richey evolves, so does the festival," adds Billie Bikakis, Event Director of the 2025 Chasco Fiesta.

Blending the traditional with the contemporary is what I think will keep Chasco alive for another century.

As shared in the article, the crew consistently outperforms state and federal standards. They also credit the crew with rejuvenating, maintaining, and modernizing the city's water plant, as well as assisting other public works departments.

# Sgt. Matthew Patsch

Sgt. Matthew Patsch stands out for his exemplary work as Sergeant of the LIFT Unit for the City of New Port Richey. Not only is he passionate about his role, he consistently expresses empathy and emotional intelligence in his work.

Sgt. Patsch's career in law enforcement spans 15 years, beginning in Pinellas County as an officer in the patrol unit, and later working his way up through the ranks at Indian Shores Police Department.

Patsch joined the City of New Port Richey in 2019 as police officer assigned to the patrol division, and later he was promoted to Field Training Officer, responsible for training incoming recruits. Sgt. Patsch has always been passionate about the educational side of his duties, and he uses his previous certified instructor experience to assist with teaching the agency's personnel in various topics.

He has since been promoted to the rank of Corporal, and then Sergeant, within the patrol division. Later on, he was called upon to form the agency's newest unit, the Life Improvement Facilitation Team (LIFT), established in 2023.

He has received a national certificate to teach Mental Health First Aid, as well as a certificate to teach Racial Intelligence (RITE), which he has used to certify all agency personnel.

"Sgt. Patsch is a standout leader within the department, embodying the values of integrity, professionalism, and community service," said Lt. Joseph Pascalli, Patsch's supervisor.

The LIFT Unit was created to assist those experiencing homelessness, drug addiction, and mental health crisis. The Unit strives to help these citizens regain their sense of self by listening to their stories, their goals, and their plans for recovery. Sgt. Patsch is on the frontlines of this effort, directly communicating with and connecting citizens to resources that will help with their transition.

I am proud to be a part of this team and to have helped build this Unit," said Patsch. "We treat everyone as a someone.

Sgt. Patsch has recently transitioned out of the LIFT Unit to help the agency meet an important goal. Named the agency's Accreditation Manager, he will assist with the accreditation process for the agency to become accredited through the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation (FCA).

In his free time, Sgt. Patsch enjoys spending time with his family, and he loves being outdoors playing golf, fishing, or hiking.

The City of New Port Richey is dedicated to being on the cutting edge of available technology. As you may already know, the city is completing the installation of iPerl smart meters.

These meters consist of an electronic water meter, a transmitter, and an antenna enabling the city to read your water meter from the office for billing purposes.

The next step the city is committed to is providing our customers a seamless way to pay your water bill, view your water usage, and even set alerts for atypical water usage or continuous flow (a leak) by providing a new single-sign-on portal.

With this new single-sign-on portal, the alerts can be sent by email, text, or voice. It is our goal to provide you the best and most innovative service available.

### SOLID WASTE RATE ADJUSTMENT

5.23%

▶ In accordance with the provisions outlined in the contract with the City of New Port Richey's single hauler, Waste Pro, a rate increase of 5.23% will be applied to all single-family residential, commercial, and multi-family services, effective April 1, 2025.

The rate is an annual adjustment and is based on the CPI. In the case of single-family residential households, the current rate is \$59.28, and the new rate will be \$62.37.

# PROTECT OUR WATERS: Simple Steps for Stormwater Management

• Keeping our waterways clean starts with small, everyday actions. Did you know that common activities - like washing your car, changing your oil, or fertilizing your garden - can contribute to water pollution?

Unlike wastewater, stormwater doesn't go to a treatment plant; it flows directly into lakes, rivers, and oceans, carrying whatever it picks up along the way. Together, we can take simple steps to minimize the impact of stormwater runoff and protect our precious water resources:

- **●** Limit fertilizer use.
  - Use fertilizers sparingly to prevent harmful nutrient buildup in waterways.
- Dispose of chemicals responsibly.
  - Never pour oil, grease, or other chemicals down storm drains. Clean up spills properly instead of washing them into the street.
- Pick up pet waste.
  - Always scoop and dispose of pet waste in the trash to prevent bacteria from entering local waters.
- (a) Wash cars wisely.
  - Opt for a commercial car wash or wash your vehicle on grass or gravel where the soapy water won't flow into storm drains.
- **♦** Keep storm drains clear.
  - Prevent litter, leaves, and debris from entering gutters and storm drains.
- Prevent soil erosion.
  - Stabilize erosion-prone areas with plants or ground cover to reduce sediment runoff.
